Science	WALT: This week you will be learning about flowering plants and how they reproduce. Step 1: 1. Click on this link https://www.twinkl.ie/go/sign-in and enter this code: NM3586. This will bring you to an ebook about 'Parts of a Flower'. 2. Click on Section 1 on the contents page. This will bring you to an image of a flower and its parts. I want you to spend time reading about the parts of the flower and their functions.
	Activity 1. Your task is to dissect a flower (break it up into its individual parts) and examine it. I would like you to be able to name as many parts of the flower as you can without referring back to the ebook. You can use any kind of flower you want. You might have some growing in your garden or you might find some in the park. 2. I want you to dissect the flower and lay it out on a piece of paper with a label beside each part. You must include a definition of its function. e.g. Petal- makes the flower look pretty, attracts birds and insects. 3. The video below outlines what you will need for the dissection and it will talk you through how to dissect the flower. In the video they use paper plates to display and label each part of the flower, you don't have to use paper plates you can just use a sheet of paper or lay it out on a table with the labels. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=T8tmVMyzu18 4. Some flowers might not have all the parts outlined in the ebook, so just label as many as you can find on the flower. You should be able to label at least 6 different parts. 5. After you have dissected the flower I want you to take some time to examine each of the parts of the flower. What do you see? What kind of textures/substances can you see on the flower? Are some parts of the flower dry/sticky, why do you think that is? Can you see any pollen? Are some parts of the flower stronger than others, why?(e.g. petal vs stem) 6. When you are finished the dissection take a photo of it so you can upload it at the end of the week. Extension: To extend this task further you could dissect two different flowers and compare the parts of each flower. Are they similar? Do they have the same parts? Do the parts of the flower look different on each plant?

Reading Response Tasks

- Villains: Who is your favourite book villain? What makes them a good villain? What are their strengths and weaknesses?
- Alternative World: If you could live in an alternative world from a book you have read, what would you choose? For example, you could go to school with Greg in Diary of a Wimpy Kid.
- Persuade me: Write a persuasive argument explaining why everyone should read the book you are reading (or a book you have read before).
- Map it out: Draw a map which includes the key settings from the text you are reading.
- Draw it out: Accurately draw a picture of a setting from your book as you visualise it.
- Character crossovers: If you could choose a character to be in a different story, who would you choose and how would they fit into their new story?
- Biography: Choose a character from the text you are reading and write a biography of their life. If you don't have all the information, make it up!
- Letter to the author: Write a letter to the author of the book you are reading and explain to them what you thought about their book. Explain to them why their book was so important, especially with current events.
- Persuasive piece: Reading is so important for all kids. Write a persuasive argument that you could read to children in the Infant Classes of our school to make them even more interested in reading.
- Report Card: Pretend you are the teacher of a character in your book. Write an end of year report for that student.
- Fast facts: Choose 10 facts to describe a character in a book or the plot of a book.
- Make a Wish Do you wish events in a story happened in a different way or had a different outcome? Share your thoughts about what you WISH would have happened.
- Word finder Find five interesting or difficult words from the text. Find the dictionary meanings and put them into sentences.
- Character Artist Draw a picture of the main character/s in the book. What image do you have in your head of the character? Find a passage in the text that describes them to help you.
- Comic Artist Do you think your book could be rewritten/ redrawn as a comic? Give it a go using pictures to help you (Note: This can be done over the course of the whole week!)
- This is Important Write down the most important events that have happened in the story (so far). If you are only starting a new book, choose a book you have read previously. Why were they important to the text?
- Character feelings Choose a character in the story. How do you think your character felt at different points in the story? Why do you think they felt this way?
- Favourite texts Write a list of your 5 favourite books of all time. Write why they are your favourite books. Make a list of how they are similar (e.g. genre, characters, plot, setting etc.) and how they are different.
- Connections Choose an event in the story and write how you may have connected to it. Explain how it reminds you of
 - Something that happened to you.
 - Something you read about in a different text.
 - Something you heard about in the wider world.
